INDUCTEE Elicia Anderson Claffey '12

Women's Cross Country/Track and Field B.A./Mathematics

Among the most accomplished athletes in Millersville history, Elicia Anderson piled up three All-America and eight All-PSAC honors in track and field and cross country while winning three PSAC Championship events from 2008-12. She still holds school records in five events.

Anderson began a dominant two-year stretch during the 2010 cross country season. In the first race of the season, she set a Millersville 5K record, running a time of 17:36. Later that season, she ran a 6K time of 21:03—the secondfastest in program history. Anderson finished runner-up at both the PSAC Championships and NCAA Atlantic Regional Championships, qualifying for the NCAA Division II Championships where her 14th-place finish earned her a first career All-America honor and the second-best national finish by a Marauder.

Anderson carried that momentum into the 2010-11 indoor season where she finished as the PSAC runner-up in the 5,000-meter run. She qualified for the NCAA Indoor Championships in the event and placed 10th for All-America status. After PSAC Championships runner-up finishes in the cross country and the indoor seasons, Anderson broke through in the 2011 outdoor season. She won the 10,000-meter run at the PSAC

Outdoor Championships with a time of 36:24.20. She bested that time just two weeks later at the NCAA Outdoor Championships with a school-record run of 34:17.31. That time earned Anderson a fourth-place finish. She qualified in the 5,000 and placed 11th.

As a senior, Anderson was again the PSAC Indoor Championships runner-up in the 5,000 and also took third in the 3,000-meter run. At the NCAA Indoor Championships, she claimed All-America honors with a sixth-place finish in the 5,000.

Anderson closed her career in 2012 by becoming the first Marauder to win both the 3,000 and 5,000 at the PSAC Outdoor Championships. For the second year in a row, Anderson qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Championships in both the 5,000 and 10,000. She brought home a 10th-place finish in the 10,000 and a 16th-place finish in the 5,000.

Over the course of her career, Anderson was a USTFCCCA All-Atlantic Region track and field performer nine times. Also an outstanding student, she was a four-time PSAC Scholar-Athlete and three-time USTFCCCA All-Academic honoree. She earned a bachelor's degree in mathematics in 2012.

Anderson is married to former Millersville soccer player John Claffey '12, and the couple has a daughter, Alivia.





Wellington Cleaver '71

Men's Basketball **B.S.E./Education**


A highly-productive post player from 1968-71, Wellington Cleaver put up numbers that still rank among Millersville's all-time leaders more than 40 years later.

Known as "Butch" during his playing days, Cleaver was a three-time All-PSAC East First Team selection, and at the time of his graduation, he was one of just four Marauders with that distinction. Cleaver was also recognized as a NAIA All-America Honorable Mention selection at the end of his junior and senior seasons. To this day, he is one of just four Marauders honored at the national level in more than one season.

Cleaver ranks 17th on Millersville's career scoring list with 1,378 points, and he hit that mark in just 68 games. His scoring average of 20.4 points per game ranks third all-time at Millersville. In his junior season of 1969-70, Cleaver scored more than 40 points three times. He concluded the year ranked second in the PSAC in scoring.

Cleaver was also a force on the boards. He pulled down 1,052 rebounds in his career, averaging an incredible 15.5 per game—the third most in school history. His 16.5 rebounds per game in 1969-70 still ranks fifth all-time, and his 15.7 rebounds per game in 1968-69 is seventh-best.

Cleaver earned a bachelor's degree in education in 1971. After a 40-year career in the commercial insurance industry working for multiple large insurance carriers, Cleaver retired in 2013. He is married to Marsharee Wilcox with three adult children: Stephen--who attended numerous Millersville games watching his father--Jennifer and Julie. He also has two grandchildren: Aiden and Maeve. He is currently a "gentleman farmer" at his home in Hampstead, Md.



INDUCTEE Ciaran Dalton '00

Men's Soccer B.S./Special Education

A prolific offensive performer for Millersville from 1995-98, Ciaran Dalton was a three-time All-PSAC performer, earning first team honors as well as All-Mid-Atlantic Region recognition as a senior.


18 years after his graduation Dalton still ranks second at Millersville in career points with 105 and second in career goals with 43, trailing only hall of famer and former teammate Sean Szerba. Dalton provided Szerba with plenty of helpers as he totaled 19 career assists—a total that ranks sixth all-time and was a school record when he graduated.

Dalton and Szerba combined to form inarguably the most productive attack in Millersville history. As a senior captain in 1998, Dalton delivered 44 points on 18 goals and eight assists—a total surpassed only by Szerba's 52 in the same season. Dalton's 18 goal total still ranks fourth all-time, and his eight assists that season ranked second when he graduated and stands in a tie for eighth today.

Dalton's 14 goals as a sophomore in 1996 was at the time the second-most in program history. A testament to his ability, Dalton and hall of famer Sean McLaughlin are the only Marauders to rank in the top six in career goals and assists.

In his final two seasons, Dalton's Marauders posted a combined 27-13-2 record. He helped his club to the PSAC Semifinals in 1997 and then guided it to a PSAC Runner-Up finish during his senior season of 1998. It was Millersville's best postseason finish in eight years, and the 14 wins accumulated during that season stood as a school record for a decade. Following graduation, Dalton played professional soccer in Ireland for the Cobh Ramblers.

Dalton graduated with a bachelor's degree in special education in 2000. He went on to earn a master's degree from Temple in 2003, and earned a Psy.D. in clinical psychology from Immaculata in 2011. Dalton is a licensed clinical psychologist, working as an emotional support teacher while serving as an assistant men's soccer coach at Swarthmore College. He has helped Swarthmore to a pair of conference championships and four NCAA Tournament appearances.



INDUCTEE Tim Naylor '93

Football **B.S./OSHM**

A linebacker's job is to make tackles, and no player in Millersville history did that job better than Tim Naylor. Millersville's all-time leader with 513 tackles and 225 solo stops, Naylor was a two-time Kodak and Don Hansen's Football Gazette Division II All-American and three-time All-PSAC East selection.

Naylor, a two-time team captain and two-time team defensive MVP, was the first Marauder to be a first, second or third team All-America selection two times at the Division II level. A four-year starter, Naylor helped the 1989 and 1990 teams to PSAC East Championships. As a freshman in 1989, Naylor ranked second on the team with 97 tackles. He ranked second on the team in both tackles (129) and sacks (8) and was named All-PSAC East Second Team as a sophomore in 1990. As a junior in 1991, Naylor led the team with 140 stops, made 2 1/2 sacks and scored All-PSAC East First Team and All-America Third Team recognition. He

was voted the team's defensive MVP at season's end.

The following year, Naylor set a Millersville record with 107 solo tackles, finishing the year with 148 and his third All-PSAC East First Team selection and an All-American Second Team nod. Naylor also recorded 5 1/2 sacks and blocked two kicks. For the second year in a row, he was named the team's defensive MVP.

Naylor earned his bachelor's degree from Millersville in 1993, a master's degree in safety sciences from Indiana University (Pa.) in 1998, and was presented with the Millersville Football Alumni Award in 2001. He is a resident of Carlisle, Pa., and is a Manager of Risk Control Services for PMA Companies. Naylor continues to live an active life competing in Ironman triathlons and staying in shape. Naylor and Tricia, his wife of 19 years, have one daughter Tess (12), who is a swimmer and field hockey player for Boiling Springs.



Joe Schneider '68

Men's Basketball/Baseball B.S.E./Elementary Education

Joe Schneider could do it all. On the hardwood he scored in bunches and harassed opponents like no other player in the storied history of Millersville men's basketball. On the baseball diamond, he was a three-year starter.

Playing his hoops career alongside of fellow Millersville hall of famers Roger Raspen and Glenn Stitzel, Schneider's defense and scoring ability was seen by his teammates as a catalyst to three consecutive NAIA District 19 titles. In his three years with the team, Millersville went a combined 57-21.


Schneider scored 1,371 career points, averaging 17.6 points per game—a mark that still ranks sixth in program history. At the other end of the court, Schneider totaled 345 steals for an average of 4.4 per game, which is more than two steals per game than any other player in program history. Schneider still ranks

fourth in PSAC history in career steals

As a junior in 1966-67, Schneider totaled 149 steals—a PSAC record to this day. As a senior in 1967-68, Schneider scored over 40 points two times and averaged 23.6 points per game. He was named All-PSAC and received the Frank Ainsworth Memorial Award as the team's MVP at the conclusion of the season.

As part of the program's 100th anniversary celebration, Schneider was voted as one of the top 30 players in Millersville history. Schneider was also inducted to the Central Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame.

Schneider earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education in 1968 and taught in the Palmyra school district for 35 years. He also coached basketball and baseball.



INDUCTEE Don Wagner '83

Wrestling B.S.E./Industrial Arts

When it comes to the long, storied history of Millersville wrestling, Don Wagner is in elite company. He is one of only two Marauders to ever win both a national championship and a PSAC Championship.

As a heavyweight for the Marauders, Wagner reached the pinnacle of Division III wrestling during his sophomore season of 1980 when he won the national championship hosted in New London, Conn. That win earned him a spot at the NCAA Division I Championships where he won one match.

The following season in 1981, Millersville made the move to Division I. Wagner won a PSAC Championship and won the Division I East Regional to qualify

for the NCAA Division I Championships where he won a match. He also took first place at the "Shorty" Hitchcock Memorial Classic and finished the season with a 32-4-1 record.

Wagner was the recipient of the Theodore H. Rupp Award for the team's most valuable wrestler in 1981.

Wagner earned a bachelor's degree in industrial arts education. He and his wife, Jennifer, have been married for 31 years, and they have three sons: Brad, Marc and Matt. Wagner is retired from New York State Corrections and resides in Milrift, Pa. Wagner is also a member of the Delaware Valley High School Sports Hall of Fame.





Barb Waltman '73

Coach
B.S.E./Elementary Education

For 33 years, Barb Waltman dedicated her life to the student-athletes at Millersville University. The longest-tenured head coach in the history of Division II women's lacrosse, Waltman is one of only three Millersville coaches to lead a team to a national championship. She retired with more wins than any other coach in Division II history and ranked 15th on the all-time wins list regardless of division.

A three-time Brine/IWLCA Division II Coach of the Year and the PSAC Coach of the Year in 1989 and 1991, Waltman's teams won three PSAC Championships and finished as the conference runner-up five times from 1982-2001. The Marauders won three consecutive PSAC titles from 1988-1990. Her 1997 club won the ECAC Tournament and her 1992 team finished as the tournament runner-up.

Waltman's crowning achievement, however, came in 1982 when her team went 10-4-1 and rolled through Denison, Franklin & Marshall and Lynchburg for the AIAW Division II Championship. It was the first Millersville women's team to win a national championship.

Six of Waltman's lacrosse players are members of the Millersville University Athletics Hall of Fame, as is the 1982 team, which was inducted as a group in 2010. She coached 81 of her lacrosse players to All-PSAC recognition and 36 more were named All-America.

Waltman's impact did not stop on the lacrosse field. She served as an assistant women's basketball coach from 1975-1995, winning three PSAC East titles and a pair of PSAC Championships. She was the assistant volleyball coach from 1992-2000, helping the program to seven PSAC East titles and a PSAC Championship. Waltman also served as the head coach of the women's tennis program from 1985-91.

As a student-athlete at Millersville, Waltman played basketball and lacrosse. She was the recipient of the Elwood J. Finley Award, which is given to the top senior athlete. Even after her retirement in 2011, Waltman has remained an integral part of the Millersville Athletics community, serving as a volunteer on game days and behind the scenes, assisting with operations.
