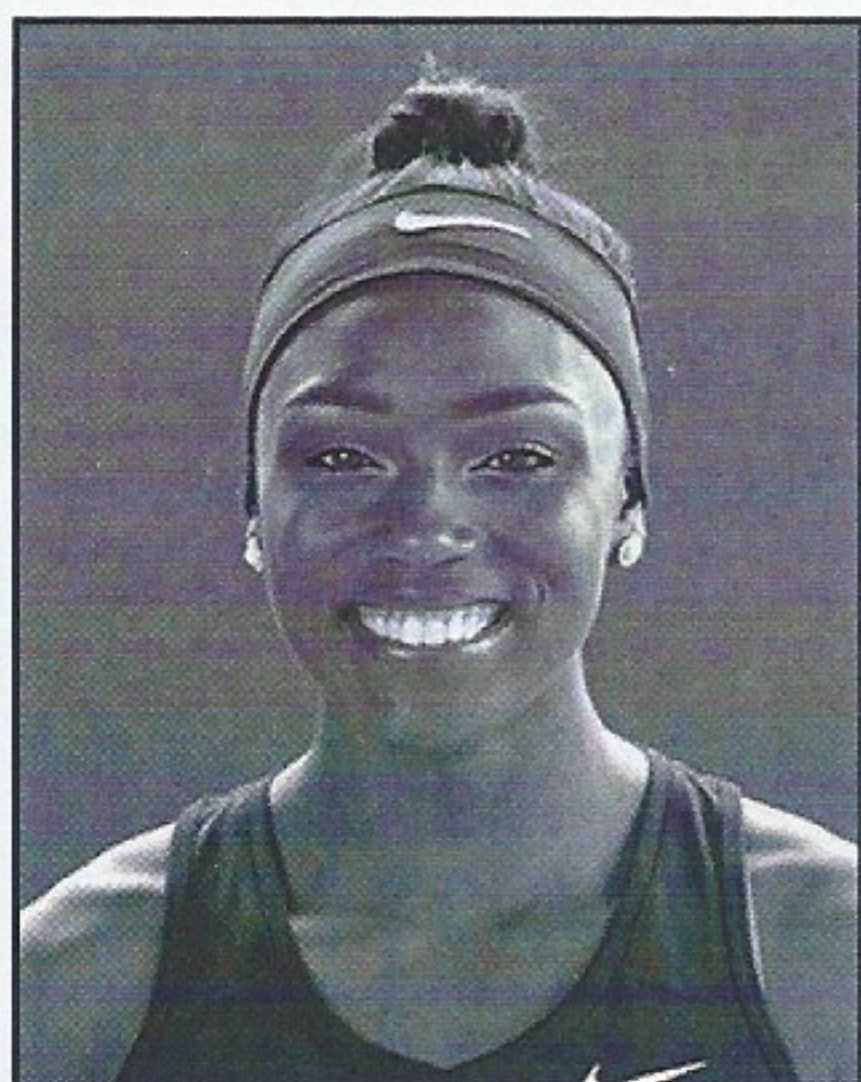

INDUCTEE

Kiara Allen '16

*Women's Track & Field
B.S./Communications*

The fastest woman in the PSAC from 2014-2016, Kiara Allen won three PSAC titles in the outdoor 100-meter dash and reached national acclaim on the indoor track. During her four-year career with the Marauders, Allen totaled 10 All-PSAC finishes, placing in the top three in eight individual events and two relays. Allen was a national qualifier in the indoor 60-meter dash and the outdoor 100-meter dash and became the only sprinter in Millersville history to earn indoor All-America honors. In 2013, 2014 and 2016, she helped set new school records in the 4x100-meter relay.

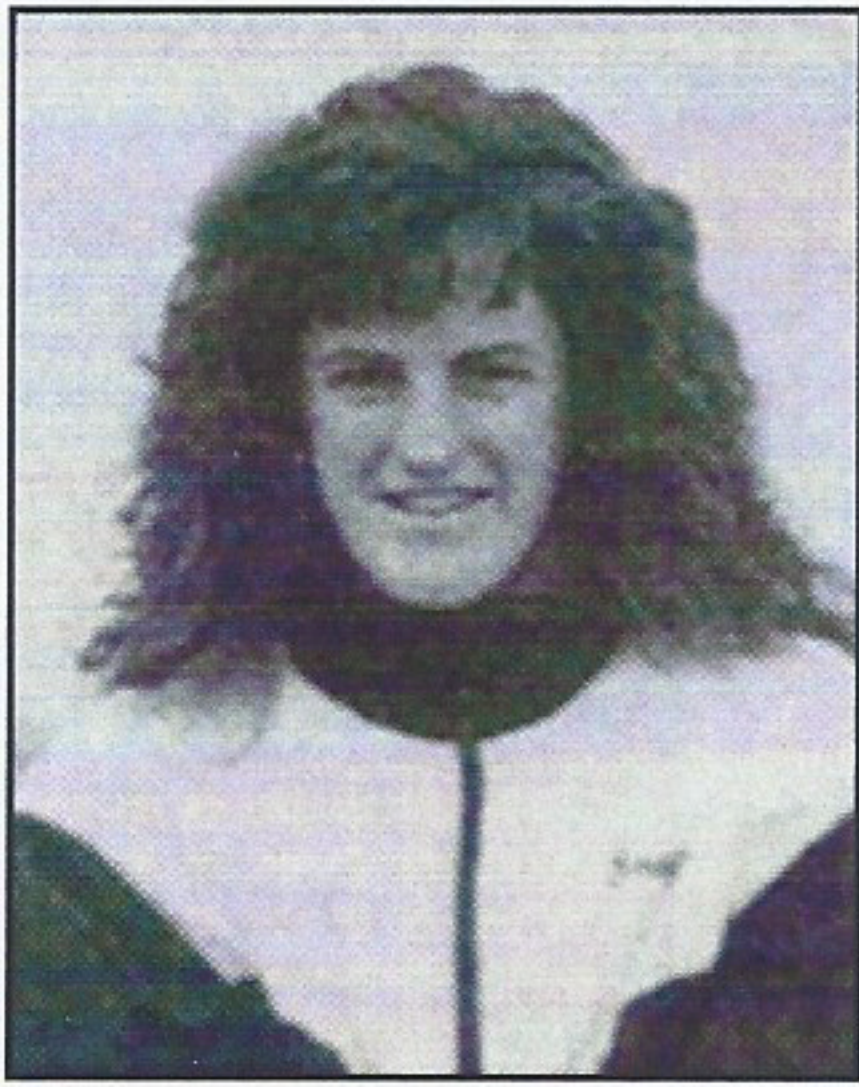
Allen broke through on the PSAC scene as a sophomore in 2014, finishing as the runner-up in the 60-meter dash at the PSAC Indoor Championships and followed that performance by running an 11.79 in the 100 during the outdoor season—the second-fastest time in program history. Allen also ran a career-best 24.96 in the 200-meter dash that season, a time that still ranks third. At the PSAC Outdoor Championships, Allen won the first of her three 100-meter dash titles and contributed to a runner-up finish in the 4x100-meter dash.

Allen was just getting started. During the 2015 indoor season, Allen again finished as the PSAC runner-up in the 60, and her season-best time earned her a spot

at the NCAA Championships where she ran a school record time of 7.53 in the prelims and then posted a 7.58 in the finals for eighth place. That made her just the fourth indoor All-American in program history. The success carried into the outdoor season as she repeated as the PSAC champ in the 100 and placed third in the 200. Allen also qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Championships that season in the 100.

As a senior in 2016, Allen tracked down the PSAC indoor championship that had eluded her the two seasons prior. She ran a 7.66 in the 60 and became the first Marauder to win an indoor PSAC title in a sprinting event. She won her third-straight 100 title, took third in the 200 and placed second in the 4x100-meter relay at the 2016 PSAC Outdoor Championships. Allen completed her career as a five-time USTFCCA All-Region honoree.

Allen graduated with a degree in speech communication in 2016 and has established a career as a public relations and marketing professional while also building a significant following as a lifestyle influencer on social media. She also has a 2 1/2-year-old son, Carter who may continue the legacy on the track or field someday.



INDUCTEE

Jennifer McDevitt Larson '92

Women's Track & Field

B.A./Spanish Education, M.A./Education

The sprinting of Jennifer McDevitt Larson helped the Millersville women's track and field program to a dominant run of team success and back-to-back-to-back PSAC Outdoor Championships in 1990, 1991 and 1992. McDevitt Larson was a three-time PSAC champion herself, winning two individual events and relay.

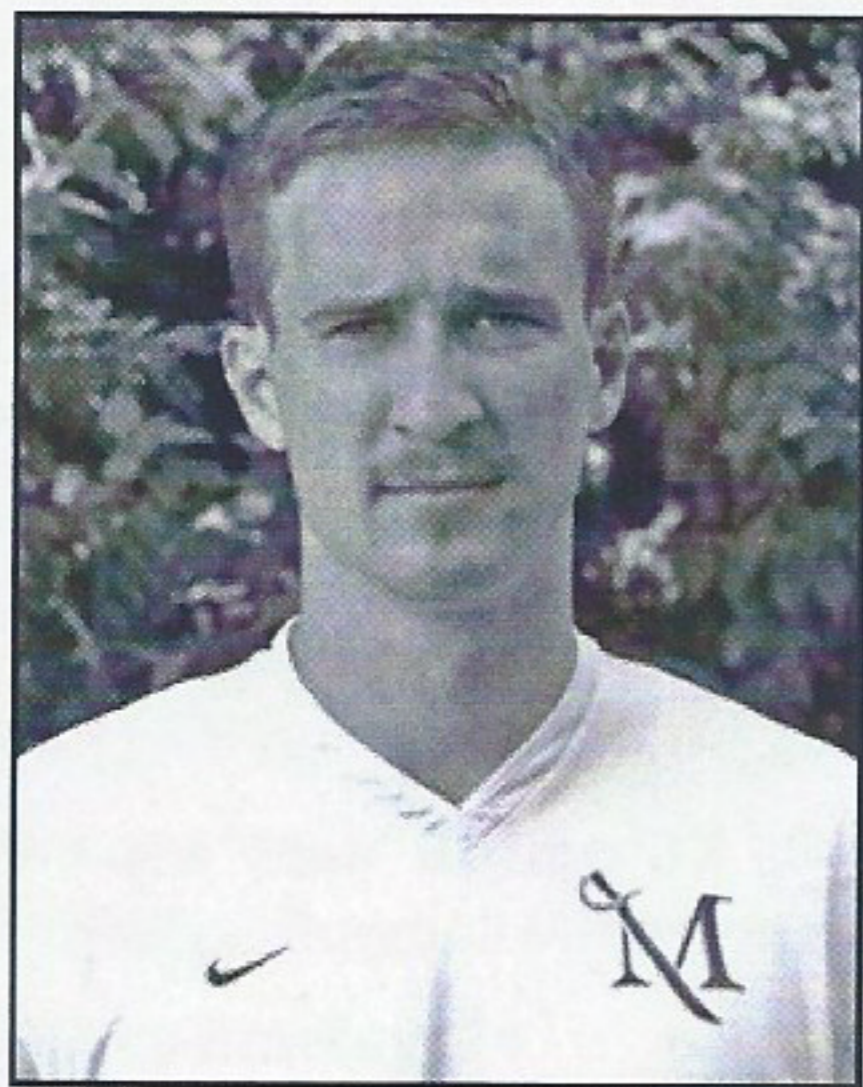
McDevitt Larson earned six All-PSAC finishes in her four-year career, and she helped set a school record in the distance medley relay as a freshman in 1989. McDevitt Larson won her first PSAC title as a sophomore in 1990 when she ran a then-career-best time of 12.75 for first place in the 100-meter dash. She was, at the time, just the third 100-meter PSAC champ in program history.

The 1991 outdoor season resulted in another dominating PSAC Championships performance by the Marauders, and McDevitt Larson was at the heart of it. She became the second Marauder to win a PSAC title in the 200-meter dash, running a time of 26.42. She finished as the runner-up in the 100. As a senior in 1992, McDevitt Larson placed second in the 100

once again. Her 4x100-meter relay team took first, and she ran a leg of the 4x400-meter relay team that placed second.

McDevitt Larson earned All-ECAC honors in two relay events and won nine individual races in her career, including the 100 at the Penn State Open in 1992. She served as team captain in 1992.

After graduating with a degree in Spanish education, McDevitt Larson earned a master's degree in education from Millersville University and became an award-winning teacher as well as an accomplished tennis player. In tennis, McDevitt Larson won USTA regional and state championships as well as numerous city championships. As an educator, McDevitt Larson started her career in southeastern Pennsylvania before moving to Kennesaw, Georgia, in 2000. She was named the Paulding County Teacher of the Year in 2016. In 2018, she was diagnosed with ALS and after a valiant battle with the disease, she passed away on Dec. 9, 2021. McDevitt Larson is survived by her husband, Mark, and their daughter Gabrielle.



INDUCTEE

Kyle Loughlin '11

Men's Soccer

B.S./Business Administration

As the Millersville men's soccer team rocketed to never-before-seen levels of success, Kyle Loughlin provided goals and assists in bunches. The 2009 PSAC East Athlete of the Year, Loughlin earned two All-PSAC East First Team and two All-Atlantic Region First Team selections while leading the Marauders to deep postseason runs and a national No. 1 ranking.

Among Millersville's most dynamic offensive performers, Loughlin still ranks second in career assists, sixth in career goals and fourth in career points. His outstanding play impacted Millersville's team success, as his Marauders posted a 57-19-4 record with two PSAC East titles, two PSAC runner-up finishes, the program's first-ever NCAA Tournament berth and a trip to the NCAA Quarterfinals in 2009. He was a member of the first graduating class to reach the postseason all four years.

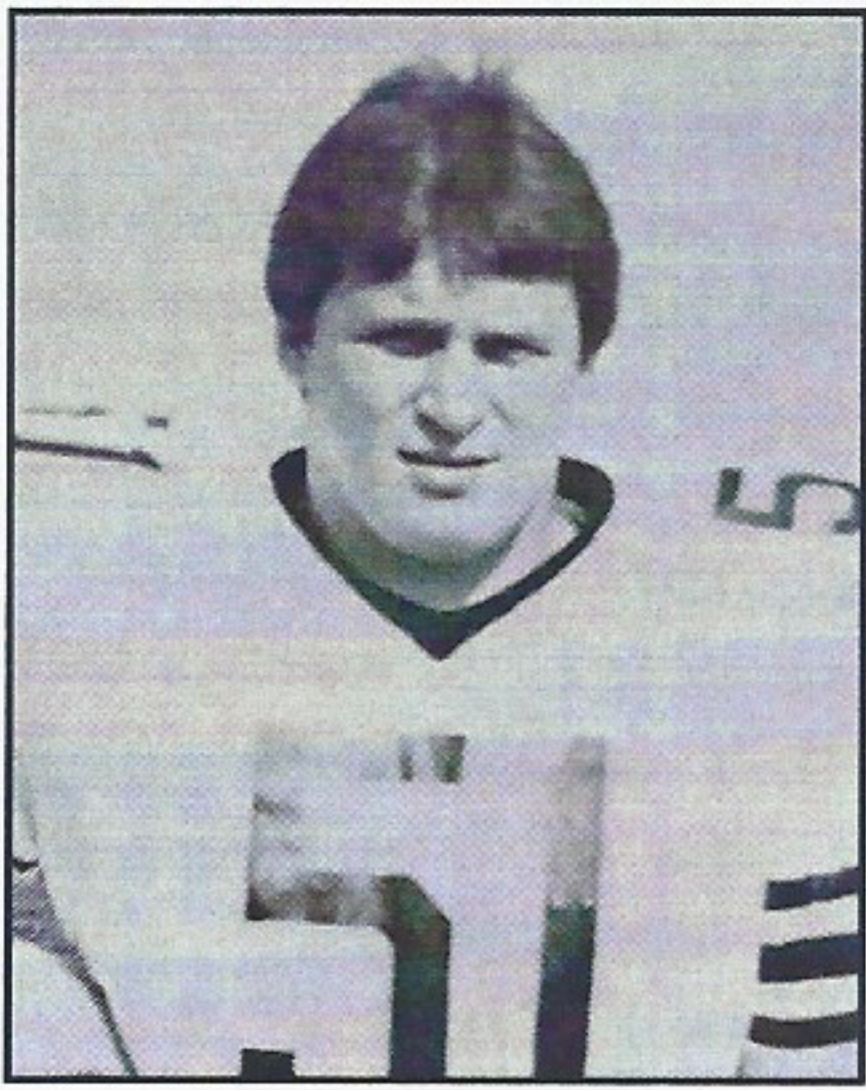
Loughlin immediately worked his way into the starting lineup as a freshman in 2007 and finished third on the team in points. It was in 2008 when the Marauders began their dominant run, and as a sophomore that season, Loughlin tallied seven goals and nine assists, again finishing third on the team in points behind hall of famer Sean McLaughlin. That Millersville team went 18-3-1, won the PSAC East, finished as the PSAC Tournament runner-up and made a memorable push through the NCAA Atlantic Regional. Loughlin was at his best in the postseason. He tallied a goal and an

assist against East Stroudsburg in the PSAC semifinals, assisted on both Marauders' goals in the championship game, and then put the finishing touches on an NCAA Tournament win over California (Pa.) with a second-half goal.

Loughlin became the primary offensive weapon for the Marauders as a junior in 2009, and he delivered 13 goals and five assists for a team-high 31 points. In leading the Marauders to a PSAC East title, a second-straight trip to the conference title game and a NCAA Tournament berth, Loughlin was named the PSAC East Athlete of the Year, All-PSAC East First Team and consensus All-Atlantic Region First Team. Loughlin's Marauders entered the postseason as the nation's No. 1-ranked team, and he scored the game-winning goal against Bloomsburg in the PSAC semifinals, and then scored the team's lone goal in the PSAC Championship match versus Slippery Rock.

Loughlin capped his Millersville career with another award-winning season in 2010. His senior season club went 11-5-2 as he tallied eight goals and five assists. He was voted All-PSAC East First Team and All-Atlantic Region First Team by Daktronics for the second season in a row.

After graduating with a degree in business administration, Loughlin became the assistant operations manager at Lehigh Valley Rail Management.



INDUCTEE

Mike Marcks '81

Football
B.S./Education

Tough, quick and relentless, Mike Marcks controlled the center of Millersville's defensive line as an ultra-productive nose guard from 1976-79. Despite tipping the scales at just over 200 pounds, Marcks disrupted opposing offenses like no Marauder that had come before him.

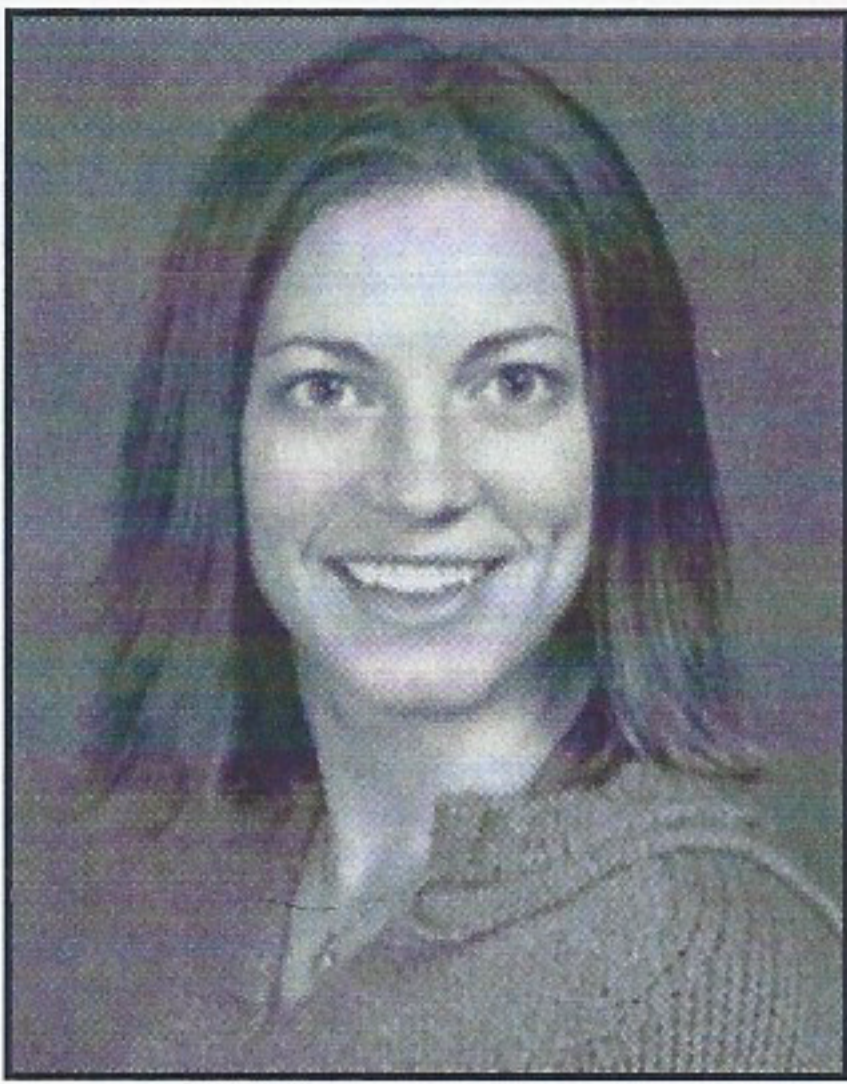
A three-time All-PSAC East First Team selection and an All-America First Team pick as a senior in 1979, Marcks posted statistics that still stand among the best in Millersville history. He ranks third in career tackles to this day. And his play translated to team success. He was an integral part of Millersville's first PSAC East Championship in 1977, and in 1979, he led the Marauders to their first NCAA Tournament appearance.

A contributor from day one on campus, Marcks totaled 14 tackles, a fumble recovery and picked off a pass as a freshman, but that was a small sample of what was to come for the Allentown, Pa., product. In 1977, he earned the first of three All-PSAC East First Team honors. He recorded the most tackles

ever by a Millersville defensive lineman with 103. He changed games with three fumble recoveries and an interception. Those Marauders ran through the East undefeated and reached the PSAC's "State Game" for the first time.

Marcks backed up his sophomore season with a team-leading 86 tackles, two interceptions and an All-America honorable mention nod as a junior in 1978. As a senior captain in 1979, Marcks helped Millersville to an 8-1 regular season and a trip to the NCAA playoffs. That season was one for the ages as Marcks earned All-America First Team status for his school-record 157 tackles. That was also the first season that sacks became an official statistic, and Marcks piled up an eye-popping 16—a total that still ranks second all-time.

After graduating with a degree in education, Marcks became a teacher, assistant principal and football coach at his alma mater, Dieruff High School. He served there his entire professional career.



INDUCTEE

Jocelyn Decker Nolen '06

*Women's Volleyball
B.S./Psychology*

The one and only All-American in Millersville volleyball history, Jocelyn Decker Nolen was an active and super-productive defensive specialist for the Millersville volleyball program from 2002-2005.

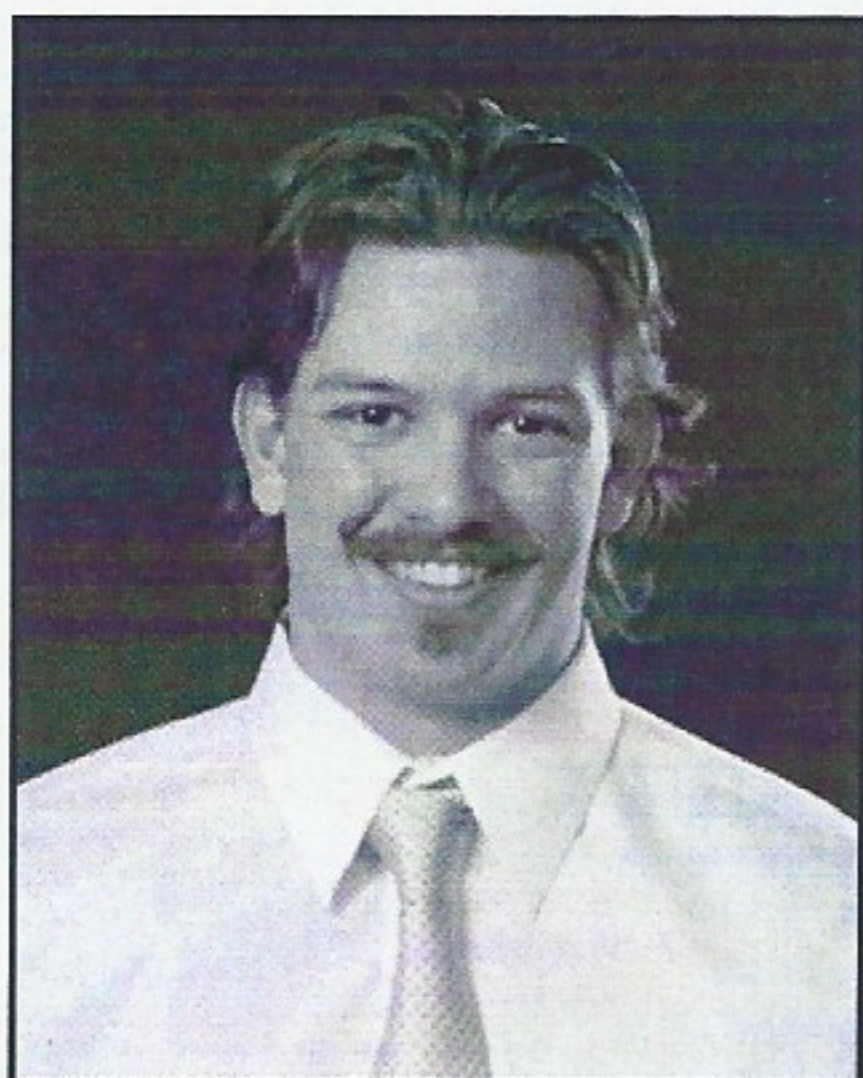
Decker Nolen set school records for both digs in a season and digs in a career during her four seasons. Her 1,661 career digs now ranks third all-time, and her 790 in 2005 still stands as the top mark.

An impactful player for four seasons, Decker Nolen played in 359 matches. She posted over 100 kills as a freshman but turned her focus to defense over the next three seasons. As a junior in 2004, she helped the Marauders reach the PSAC Tournament while totaling 504 digs and 45 service aces. She was named ABCA All-Atlantic Region Honorable Mention.

Her senior season of 2005 was one to

remember. As one of only two players to play in all 111 of the team's sets, Decker Nolen recorded the second-most digs in PSAC history and ranked second on the team with 47 aces. Again, the Marauders reached the PSAC Tournament, and Decker Nolen was named All-PSAC East First Team, consensus All-Atlantic Region First Team and Daktronics All-America First Team. Nolen was later listed as one of the program's "30 Players for 30 Years" during its anniversary celebration.

After graduating with a degree in psychology, Decker Nolen continued her volleyball career, playing in the Toyota Pro Beach Tour and winning the USAV women's 6's national tournament in 2011. She also paired with her sister, Kristen Deonarine, to win the Pottstown Rumble in 2009. Nolen now resides in Lebanon with her husband, Chad, and is a full-time mother to her three children.



INDUCTEE

Dan Stoltzfus '16

Baseball
B.S./Occupational Safety and Environmental Health

As talented a hitter that has ever donned the Black & Gold, Dan Stoltzfus was a two-time All-PSAC East First Team selection and a 2015 All-American, anchoring three PSAC East championship teams as the clean-up hitter and first baseman.

Stoltzfus could do it all at the plate. His .380 career batting average ranks fifth all-time and the best by any Marauder since 1990. He set the Millersville record for RBIs with 180, smashing the previous record by 22. His 23 career home runs rank second all-time, and he graduated with the fourth-most doubles. When his career finished in 2016, Stoltzfus ranked seventh all-time among PSAC players in RBIs and was the only player in the conference's history with two seasons of 70-plus RBIs.

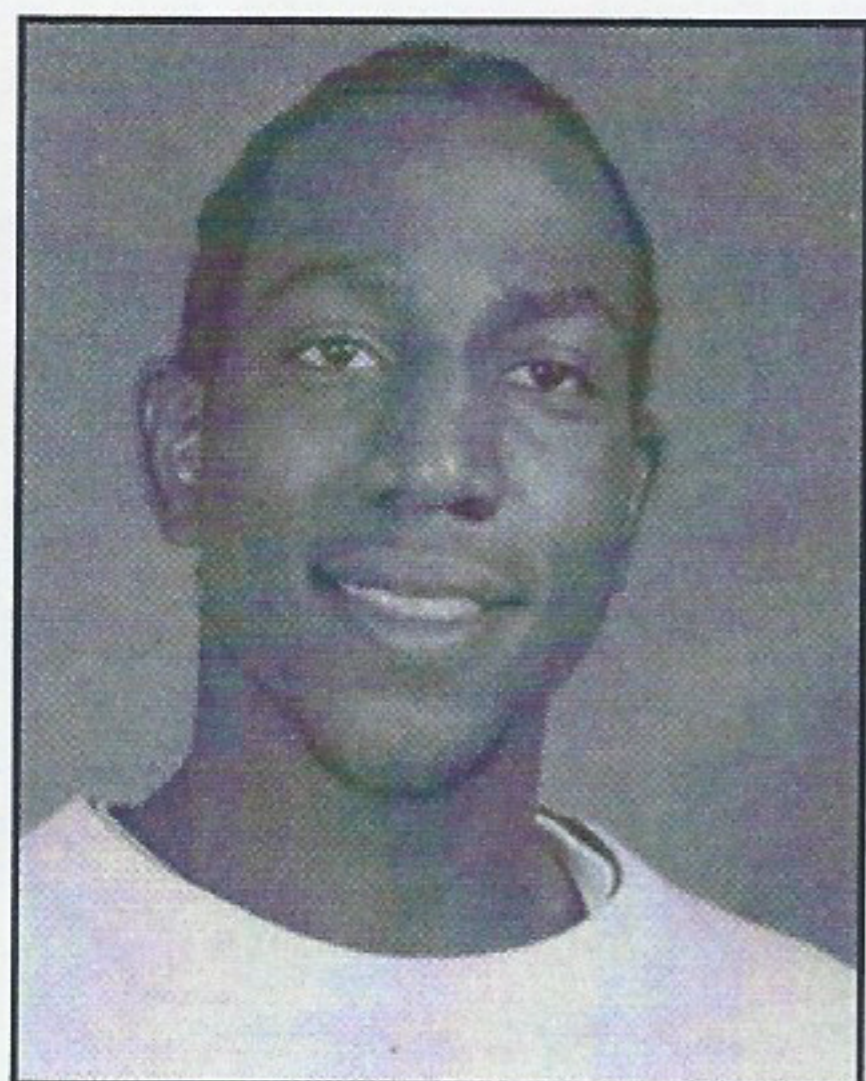
Marauder fans saw glimpses of Stoltzfus' talent in his first two seasons, as he hit .333 in limited opportunities as a true freshman and overcame a lengthy stint on the injured list as a sophomore to hit .305. At the end of his sophomore season, Stoltzfus doubled and scored the game-winning run against Kutztown in the NCAA Atlantic Regional, and then doubled against Mercyhurst, leading to another game-winning run in extra innings. Those postseason exploits were certainly an omen.

Stoltzfus' junior season of 2015 was one for the record books. He set single season Millersville records with 15 home runs, 81 RBIs and 136 total bases. He drove in more runs than any PSAC player in 26 years, and that earned him All-PSAC East First Team, ABCA All-Atlantic

Region First Team and ABCA All-America Third Team recognition. That made Stoltzfus the first Marauder position player in 25 years to earn the coaches' organization All-America honor. Stoltzfus hit .396 on the season, and as Millersville made a run to its first PSAC Championship in 17 years, he drove in eight runs on six hits in the PSAC Tournament. In the quarterfinals, he hit a game-tying home run in the bottom of the ninth against Mercyhurst. That momentum carried into the NCAA Atlantic Regional where he went 4-for-4 in the opener, and then crushed a dramatic, walk-off home run in extra innings against Seton Hill.

Stoltzfus' best was yet to come, however. In 2016, he led arguably the best lineup in team history, helping the club to a record 53 wins and an NCAA runner-up finish. Stoltzfus hit .414 with a .469 on base percentage, breaking the program record for doubles with 24 while also leading the PSAC in hits and RBIs. His 94 hits were the fourth-most in PSAC history. In Millersville's run to the PSAC title game, an NCAA Atlantic Regional championship, and the final game of the College World Series, Stoltzfus hit .412 with 19 RBIs across 12 games. He went 3-for-4 in the regional championship game, and in the World Series, he hit .438. Stoltzfus earned All-PSAC East First Team and D2CCA All-Atlantic Region First Team recognition.

After graduating with a degree in occupational safety and environmental health, Stoltzfus became a safety and risk advisor for Univest Insurance. He married his wife, Brooke, in 2021.



INDUCTEE

Tooichi Udeinya '06

Men's Basketball
B.S./Industrial Technology

Tooichi Udeinya impacted the game at both ends of the court with his versatility, defense, rebounding and scoring, helping lead Millersville men's basketball to a PSAC Championship.

Already in elite company, Udeinya and fellow hall of famers Charlie Parker, Phil Walker and John Fox are the only players in Millersville basketball's storied history to be four-time All-PSAC East selections. Udeinya scored 1,424 points in his career—good for 17th all-time. He also averaged 8.4 rebounds per game, and his 957 total rebounds are the most by any Marauder post-1987.

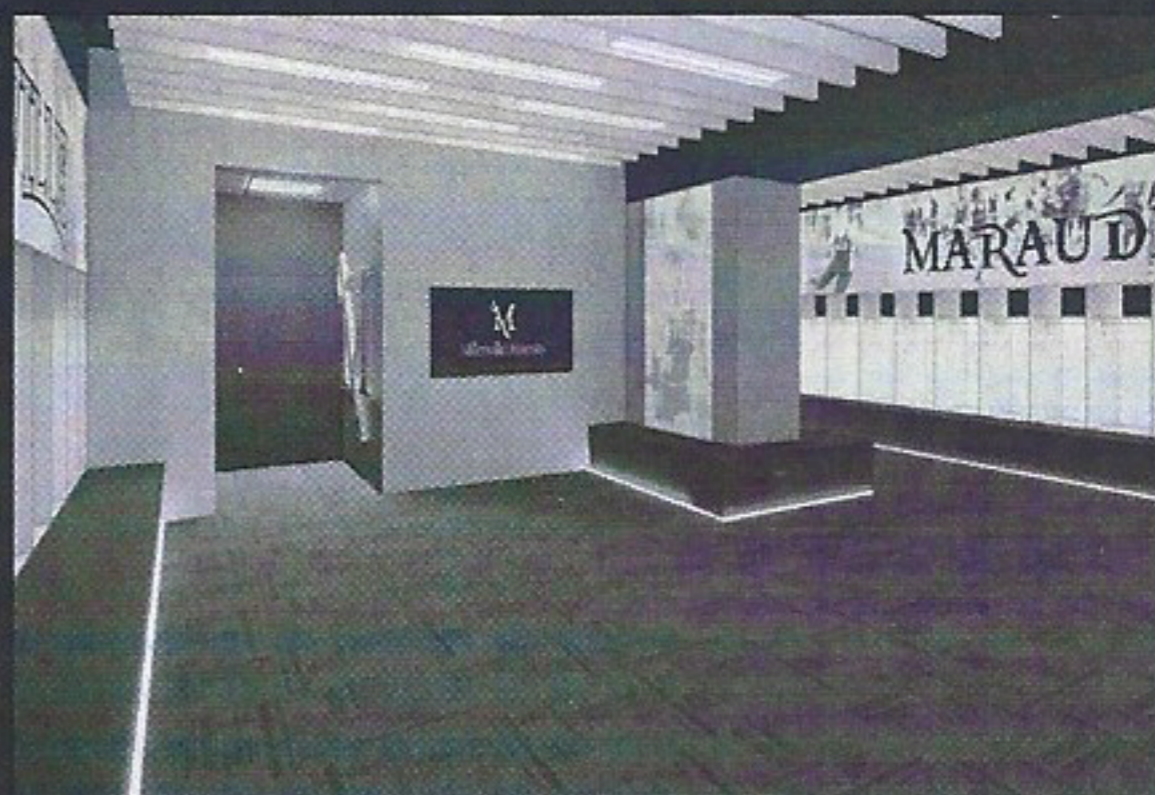
Udeinya's difference-making impact on the program proved immediate. Voted the 2002 PSAC East Freshman of the Year, Udeinya led the team in rebounding (8.5) and ranked second on the team in scoring while helping the team to 17 wins and a postseason appearance. There was no sophomore slump in 2002-03 as Udeinya posted identical scoring and rebounding numbers while helping the Marauders to a 26-6 record, a PSAC East title, a PSAC Championship and a run to the NCAA East Regional title game. That season included a magical 13-game winning streak that ran through the postseason. Udeinya led the Marauders in rebounding in 11 of those games, grabbing double-digit boards eight times. He scored 12 points with three steals and two blocks in the PSAC

title game victory over California (Pa.) after posting double-doubles in the first two rounds. Udeinya also recorded a team-high 18 points and 13 rebounds in the NCAA Tournament win over Barton.

Tooichi led the 2003-04 club in scoring (15.1) and rebounding (8.4) to garner All-PSAC East First Team honors. And in 2004-05, he was one of four Marauders to earn All-PSAC East recognition as the team went 22-8, reaching the PSAC title game once again and qualifying for the NCAA Tournament. With remarkable consistency, Udeinya averaged 11.8 points and 8.6 rebounds per game while also ranking second on the team in assists. His 14 rebounds and three blocks helped Millersville beat Shippensburg in the semifinals, and he added 10 points and a team-high four assists in the title game.

Tooichi Udeinya graduated with a bachelor's degree in Industrial Technology in 2006. He has also served more than 14 years in the United States Navy as an Aerospace Maintenance Duty Officer with deployments in support of Operations Enduring Freedom, Inherent Resolve, Freedom's Sentinel, and Allies Refuge. His military awards include Navy Marine Corps Commendation Medal (5), Navy Marine Corps Achievement Medal (2), National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal, and the Humanitarian Service Medal (2).

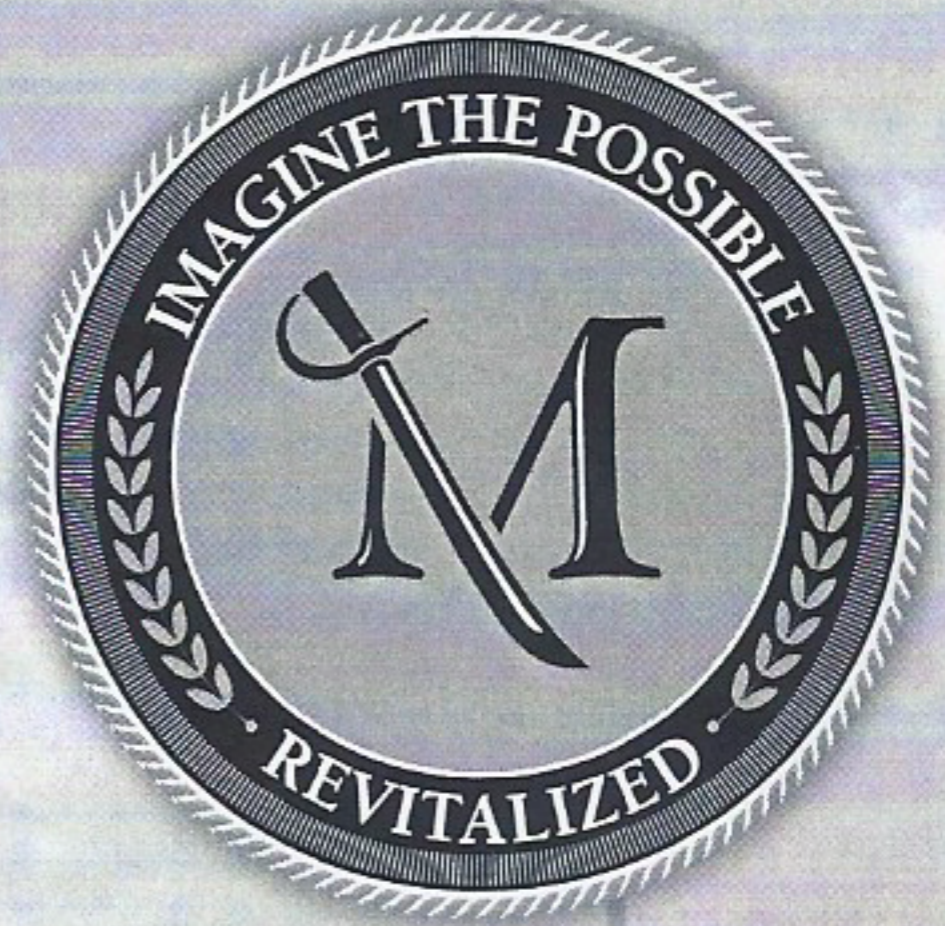
